

## Hungry tides in India's Sundarbans


Rising sea levels have submerged several islands and created thousands of refugees.

## Wildlife and marine nurseries

The Sundarbans extend across southern Bangladesh and West Bengal in India in the vast delta formed by the confluence of the Ganges, Brahmaputra, and Meghna rivers that empty themselves in the Bay of Bengal.

Mangroves in this region act as natural buffers against tropical cyclones and also as filtration systems for estuarine and fresh water. They also serve as nurseries for many marine invertebrate species and fish.

The archipelago of crisscrossed islands, which is spread over a 20,000 sq km area of mostly swamp land, is home to the endangered Royal Bengal variety of tigers, crocodiles and around 4.3 million people.



The Sundarbans, which has been declared a World Heritage site by Unesco and became the backdrop of writer Amitav Ghosh's celebrated book The Hungry Tide, face a threat from global warming and attendant climatic change. It is the living reality of what world leaders and experts are debating in Copenhagen.

A United Nations study has estimated that a mere 45cm rise in sea levels will destroy 75 per cent of forests spread over a 10,000 sq km area in the Sundarbans.

"About a year ago there were about 7,000 environmental refugees in the Sundarbans. The figure can only increase as the rising sea submerges more and more lands," says Pranabes Sanyal of the School of Oceanographic Studies in Jadavpur University (JU).

"Sundarbans lost more than 28 per cent of its land in the past 40 years owing to global warming. About 70,000 people can turn [into] environmental refugees in the next 30 years," he warns.

#### Shrinking mangroves

JU's oceanographic department conducted a 10-year study in and around the Bay of Bengal and concluded that the sea is rising at 3.14 mm a year in the Sundarbans against a global average of 2 mm.

As sea levels rise, two islands have already disappeared and others are prone to inundation.

"There is no one to care for the people of Sundarbans where the impact of global warming is severe. In 30 years we lost 90 sq km of area which included two islands," says a bitter Sugato Hazra, the director of the School of Oceanographic Studies in JU.

Experts say the shrinking mangroves are leaving India and Bangladesh vulnerable to the effects of severe weather patterns in the Bay of Bengal. The recent Cyclone Aila wreaked havoc in the islands uprooting more than two million people.

"High intensity cyclones and associated surges are increasing in Bay

of Bengal because of the rise in the sea surface temperature," Hazra says, ruing a lack of government initiatives to help the climate refugees.

"They have no one to speak for them anywhere," he says.

#### Royal Bengal tigers

Climate change is also threatening the famous Royal Bengal tiger population of the Sundarbans archipelago.

The number of tiger attacks on people is rising in Sundarban islands as core habitat loss and scarcity of prey force







the big cats to stray into human habitation for food.

"The tigers are carnivores and they prey on herbivores like deer and pigs which are also dwindling in population because of loss of land and grazing ground from the rising sea," animal expert Debasis Chakrabarti says.

"With the food security under threat, tigers also breed less. They become more endangered," he says.

## Dog hospital gets a cool facelift

Kolkata: Old and frail stray dogs in the city will now be spared the winter chills. The health department of Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC) opened its doors to an old age cum healthcare centre for stray dogs at Dhapa on Thursday. The civic body

which had taken over the dog hospital from an NGO has given a facelift to the hospital.

The centre has 250 cages for dogs that may fall ill owing to old age. Besides, the civic health officials may also pick up dogs from the streets to sterilize and vaccinate them.

With three modern operation theatres and an expert team of veterinary

surgeons and paramedics, the hospital can operate on 900 dogs every month, said Atin Ghosh, the member, mayorin-council who opened the dog hospital at Dhapa.

The hospital will be operated by KMC alone. "We will build the required infrastructure to run the hospital," added Ghosh. [Excerpts]

The survival of the Jarawa tribe of the Andaman Islands is threatened by a disturbing new trend: human safaris.

First exposed by tribal rights group Survival International in 2010 and brought to light by an unsettling video uploaded by British newspaper The Observer, dozens of visitors to the remote Andaman Islands — between India and Burma in the Bay of Bengal — queue up daily at dawn to drive through a jungle reserve set aside for the Jarawa tribe. The tourists then toss scraps of food to the half-naked natives, commanding them to dance.

The video footage posted online is the kind of exotic encounter some tourists dream about when they set out on a so-called safari, but the practice is both devastating and humiliating for the tribe involved.

Some 400-strong, the Jarawas live in the thick forests of South and Middle Andaman hunting pig and monitor lizard and fishing with bows and arrows. Short, dark-skinned with curly hair, they resemble African bushmen in appearance. They are a nomadic people that live in bands of 40-50 and are thought to be amongst the first people to migrate successfully from Africa to Asia.

The Jarawa people lived successfully on their island without contact with outsiders for probably about 55,000 years, until 1998. Today, a road runs right through their forest home and they risk decimation by disease. They call themselves the Ang, which means 'human being,' yet they are being ogled at like animals in a game reserve.

The very last member of the neighboring Bo tribe died in January. We must not allow the same fate to befall the Jarawa, or the world will lose yet another vibrant, knowledgeable and complex part of humankind.

The Andaman and Nicobar tropical island chain is home to four other rare tribes — Onge, the Great Andamanese, the Sentinelese and the Shompens, each numbering less than 350 members. [Excerpts]

## Supreme Court bars entry of tourists in Jarawa tribe habitat

NEW DELHI: The Supreme Court on Monday wanted to know from Andaman & Nicobar Island administration whether it intended to keep in isolation the extremely endangered Jarawa tribe, which numbered just over 300, and banned all tourist movement in their habitat.

"We need to know the policy of the government. Whether they want the

Jarawas to be kept in isolation or to be assimilated in the mainstream," asked a bench of Justices G S Singhvi and H L Gokhale before banning till February 26 movement of all tourist vehicles through the forest road passing through the tribe's habitat.

This order of the court will stop 60 vehicles carrying tourists every day under police escort on the 46-km Andaman Trunk Road that links North Andaman to its southern part, mostly passing through reserve forests and the habitation of Jarawas exposing them to tour operators' antics.

"In India most of the laws are observed in breach," it said before banning tourist movement through the 46-km road link. However, on Kuhad's request, the bench allowed plying of government vehicles carrying essential commodities for Jarawas and other tribes residing in the reserve forest.

The "no-go" zone order resulted from the pitiable sight of semi-clad Jarawa men, women and children being made to dance in front of tourists in return for food.. [Excerpts]

## Lifeline express crushes 6 elephants

Six elephants were mowed down and a train attendant was hurled to death when the Chennai-bound Coromandel Express ploughed into a herd in Odisha at 110km per hour, far above the speed limit prescribed for migration corridors.

The Howrah-originated train, eastern India's most dependable lifeline to healthcare facilities in the south, left behind a gut-wrenching trail at Ganjam district last night, dragging a pregnant elephant for half a kilometre and ripping out its two-month-old foetus.

The dead elephants were a tusker aged 25 to 30, three female elephants aged between 45 and 47, and two babies.

The tragedy has again brought to the fore the man-animal conflict and raised questions about the efficacy of the warning systems.

Forest officials blamed the train's speed."Railway tracks cut through the migration corridor. It is one of the most perilous tracks for wild elephants. We have placed 10 signboards saying 'Elephant Crossing Zone' along the tracks to remind train drivers that they are supposed to keep the speed below 20 kmph in this zone. [Excerpts]

## Neglect animals at your own peril

Swine flu pandemic infected at least one in five Indians:

LONDON: The 2009 global H5N1 swine flu pandemic - the first in over 41 years that swept throughout the globe in record time — infected at least one in five Indians with the highest rates of infection being among children.

A joint Imperial College, London, and the World Health Organization global study released on Saturday found that 47% of those aged five to 19 showed signs of having caught the deadly influenza virus in India.

The study analyzed data from 19 countries, including India, UK, US and China, to assess the global impact of the 2009 pandemic.

It collated results from over two dozen research studies involving more than 90,000 blood samples collected before, during and after the pandemic and showed that the virus that continues to infect and kill Indians now affected 20-27% people studied during the first year of the pandemic.

The study was published in "Influenza and Other Respiratory Viruses" journal on January 26.

The WHO in August 2009 issued the swine flu alert to the highest pandemic level, signaling that a global epidemic of the H1N1 virus had begun. It first

detected the novel pandemic influenza H1N1 virus in Mexico and the US in April 2009.

The last flu pandemic was declared in 1968 when H3N1 virus strain killed an estimated 1 million people.

The US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Atlanta, recently said India may have grossly underestimated the might of 21st century's most aggressive pandemic.

"An additional 83,300 cardiovascular deaths associated with the 2009 pandemic influenza were estimated to have occurred in people older than 17 years globally, resulting in a total of 284,400 respiratory and cardiovascular deaths. Around 20% of these deaths occurred in people older than 64 years," the CDC study said. [Excerpts]



আমার গাডির ইঞ্জিন খারাপ হয়ে যাবে। মহিলা বললেন, এই গাছ মাথা কেটে দিলে দেখতে খারাপ লাগবে। Secretary বলতে থাকেন, গাছের পাতা আমার গাড়ির ওপর পডছে, গাড়ি নোংরা হচ্ছে, ইত্যাদি। যাই হোক, একথায় ওকথায় তখনকার মতো গাছ কাটা বন্ধ হয়। কিন্তু এর কিছুদিন পর Secretary ফোন করে মহিলাকে বলেন, আপনি আমাকে লিখে দিন যে গাছ যদি আমার গাড়ির ওপর ভেঙে পড়ে, তবে তার জন্য আপনি ক্ষতিপুরণ দিতে রাজি আছেন। না হলে আমি গাছ কেটে দেব। কয়েকদিন পর Secretary আবার ফোন করে বলেন, আপনি কি ব্যবস্থা করলেন? মহিলা বলেন, আমি কয়েকজন অভিজ্ঞ লোকের সঙ্গে এই বিষয়ে কথা বলেছি। তাঁদের অভিমত, এই ধরনের গাছ খুব শক্ত। এর শিকড মাটির খুব গভীরে চলে যায়। অনেক মালিকেও দেখিয়েছি। সকলের একই মত যে এই ধরনের গাছ প্রচন্ড ঝডে নুয়ে পডলেও কখনও ভেঙে পড়েনি। উত্তরে Secretary বললেন, আপনাকে আমি অনেক সময় দিয়েছি। আর সময় দেওয়া যাবেনা। কথায় কথায় ভদ্রমহিলা বলেন, যে আইন আছে, আপনি এইভাবে কোন গাছ কাটতে পারেন না। Secretary বলেন, এমন অনেক আইন তাঁর দেখা আছে। প্রয়োজন হলে তিনি যা খুশি করতে

বৃদ্ধা মহিলা আবাসনের কয়েকজন সদস্যকে ব্যপারটা জানান। কিন্তু কোন সুফল হয়নি। কেউ কেউ তাঁকে থানায় অভিযোগ জানাতে বলেন। কিন্তু প্রকৃতপক্ষে কেউ এগিয়ে আসেননি।

নিরুপায় হয়ে ভদ্রমহিলা বনদপ্তরে গিয়ে একটি লিখিত অভিযোগ করেন, কী উপায়ে গাছটি রক্ষা করা যায জানতে চান। কিন্তু দুর্ভাগ্যবশত বনদপ্তর প্রয়োজনীয় ব্যবস্থার প্রতিশ্রুতি দিলেও কোন ব্যবস্থার প্রতিশ্রুতি দিলেও কোন ব্যবস্থা গ্রহণ করেনি।

#### Lions at risk as Indian states feud

Plan to relocate Asiatic lion stalls as states compete for tourism business. Krittivas Mukherjee 21 Aug 2012;

**NEW DELHI** - The world's last remaining Asiatic lions could become the victims of success of a plan to save them from extinction, as their swelling numbers in a small jungle in India make them vulnerable to disease, a shrinking prey base and territorial fights, animal conservationists say.

Yet a ready plan to move some of them to a new home in another patch of forest is caught in a bureaucratic catfight between two Indian states. The dispute has reached the Supreme Court, which now has to rule on the fate of these big cats.

There were fewer than 50 Asiatic lions at the Gir sanctuary in the western state of Gujarat at the turn of the last century, but successful conservation saw their population grow to 411 at last count in 2010.

But their fragile comeback from nearextinction is being threatened by overpopulation in the 1,400 sq km Gir sanctuary, which is quickly running out of space. Gujarat has created a smaller semi-sanctuary close to Gir but that is not enough.

Unless they are moved, experts warn, the big cats are still at risk of extinction from a single epidemic or a natural disaster. Overcrowding also means a





shortage of prey, inbreeding and more frequent deadly turf fights.

Smaller grazing grounds have also increased man-animal conflict as Gir's lions have begun straying into nearby farms and villages. Over the past decade, some two dozen lions have drowned after falling into wells used by villagers living in the buffer zone.

Wildlife experts blame humans.

"Lions are not entering villages, humans are entering their habitats," Mr Debasis Chakrabarti, founder of animal rights group Compassionate Crusaders Trust told The Straits Times.

Conservationists saw a solution in a new home for the lions, far away from Gir in a rugged and hilly sanctuary called Kuno in neighbouring Madhya Pradesh state. But Gujarat has refused to send any of its lions there.

The tussle saw an ecologist involved in getting Kuno ready seek the court's intervention.

Earlier this month, Gujarat told the Supreme Court that Madhya Pradesh had failed to keep its dwindling tiger population safe from poachers, and hence relocating any of its lions there would be unwise.

"Asiatic lions are our unique pride, what is the need to send them anywhere when we are doing a great job of conserving them," Gujarat's environment secretary S.K. Nanda argued.

Almost as large as their African cousin, male Asiatic lions have less fluffy manes and their tails have larger tufts. This sub-species once roamed the jungles from Morocco and Greece across the Middle East to India. By the 20th century, trophy hunting had nearly decimated their population.

In India, though, the last few dozen Asiatic lions were given a shot at life after a princely ruler banned hunting in 1901.

Under protection, the Asiatic lions have thrived in Gujarat even as tigers and other wildlife across India have continued to be hunted or poached, pushing them ever closer to extinction.

The tussle between the two states, many experts say, is actually a fight for pride and tourism business, rather than concern for the big cats - Madhya Pradesh for boosting wildlife tourism, Gujarat for retaining its unique branding as the sole sanctuary of Asiatic lions in the wild in the world.

Mr Chakrabarti says the first option should be to try to secure and enlarge the buffer zone for lions in Gir itself.

"Airlifting these lions should be the last option," he said.

"There are issues with relocation like availability of prey and suitable conditions. Often translocation results in deaths of a species". (Excerpts)






#### Ashis


