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First Annual Mahavir Jayanti Lecture at FIU

"Visions of the Conqueror – Jain Art" by Phyllis Graoff, Yale University.

Academic celebration of Mahavir Jayanti in FIU campus began by convening "Visions of the Conqueror - Jain Art", presented by an inquisitive Scholar, Phyllis Graoff, Yale University. The lecture was sponsored by Bhagawan Mahavir Professorship of Jain Studies, Jain Education & Research foundation, Target's "After Hours" at the Frost Jain Studies and Religious Studies, and Museum.

The night began with a prayer, led by Jain nuns, whose presence has been felt since they began teaching classes six years ago on campus. Nathan Katz, Professor of

FIU Students Community Outreach Program

Students from FIU visited Jain Temple to get a one to one exposure to Jain practice & rituals. About 15 students explored Jain worship & belief firsthand. Here is the insiders' story of what they carried home from this event.

"The idea of Ahimsa (nonviolence) is so strong that Jains also practice strict vegetarianism. I found this devotion to be very interesting, and an inspiring indication of how seriously they take their doctrine:, said one of the participant. Matthew Preston was impressed, "I also found the traditional idols to be quite beautiful, and their simplicity making them appears stoic and holy". Stephanie Londono



says, "I left my shoes out the door and also my purse because it was made out of leather, a material that is prohibited in the Jain religion because it comes from a living being. This was my first encounter with the Jain religion, and this was my first lesson in Ahimsa, or nonviolence, toward any living being". Catherine I. Fernandez respects Jain unity in the temple. She adds, "The idea of respect for others could be seen in both the temple setup and the temple's toleration of all sects". Shannon Valdes shares,"I think the religion is rather beautiful, as is the manifestation of the religion in its temples. For the first time ever in visiting a religious place of worship, nothing stroked me in a negative way."



Students & Professors Visit India to Explore Jainism

A group of FIU students and professors traveled to India this year to study Jainism, as part of the Bhagwan Mahavir Professorship, held by Professor Nathan Katz (center front). With him are two Jain samanis (nuns) who

"We can do just so much in the classroom," Katz said, "but to enhance traditional learning with travel and study in a great civilization like India's, can be a life-changing journey for our students and our faculty. On our side, we have welcomed JVBU staff to teach at FIU, and this year we will have JVBU students studying here." (from FIU Online by Deborah O'Neill).

One of the students, Berman, shares, "I have found that most of what can be learned about the world is in the world, not necessarily in books. I can read about a stream, but I will never know a stream without seeing its water effortlessly flowing around its stones... Going through the journey to India, interacting with those practicing Jainism directly, including myself in the practices and



teachings of Jainism, and reflecting on each day spent in India will enhance my understanding of a unique religion held by my fellow citizens of the earth. It is a moral responsibility to seek the perspective of the world through the eyes of many. This is what I hope to achieve by studying Jainism in India." (from FIU Online by Deborah O'Neill).

Assistant professor Whitney Bauman, from religious studies, visited several Jain communities and educational institutions in Delhi, Jaipur, Indore, and Ladnun to explore the Jain doctrine that not only humans and animals, but plants, rivers, and mountains – indeed, all of nature possess life. He saw how the cardinal Jain teaching of non-violence (ahimsa) is applied to nature.

"Jains are small in number," said Dr. Nathan Katz, "but enormous in influence."

The Annual Mahavir Jayanti Lecture

Mahavir Jayanti Annual Lecture series organized by Bhagawan Mahavir professorship of Jain Studies:

Prof John C. Cort, Professor at Denison University will present "Jain Art: Icons and Iconoclasts in Jainism".

John E. Cort has degrees in South Asian Studies from the University of Wisconsin (B.A., 1974; M.A., 1982), and in the Study of religion from Harvard University (A.M., 1984; Ph.D., 1989). John Cort's research focuses on the Jain traditions of South Asia, on which he has conducted extensive fieldwork as well as textual studies.



Prof. Cort has received research grants from the Asian Cultural Council, Getty Foundation, and American Institute of Indian Studies. In addition, he is working on series of essays exploring the roles and expressions of religious devotion within the Jain traditions.

He is also active with several organizations involved with the study of India, religion, and art at the national level. He is Secretary of the Executive Committee of the American Institute of Indian Studies, and on the Board of Trustees of the American Council for Southern Asian Art.

Jain Studies at FIU

New Courses offered in Spring 2011

Undergraduate Courses

Prof. Nathan Katz, Samani Dr Chaitanya Pragya and Unnata Pragya developed the following three new undergraduate courses focussed on the studies of Jain scriptures and philosophical texts. Almost 80 students have been enrolled in the courses thus far.

- Religious Classics of Asia
- Intro to Sanskrit Language
- South Asian Culture

Dr Nathan Katz, Professor of Religious Studies at FIU, invited Samani Chaitanya Pragya to co-teach the course "*Religious Classics* of Asia". Samaniji explored the "Concept of Soul and Liberation in Jain and Yoga Tradition". She discussed the concept of spirituality, rebirth and eternality of soul, liberation and meditation on the basis of the canon Acharanga and the philosophical treatises Tattvartha Sutra of Umaswati and Yoga-Sutra of Patanjali. The idea



of God, soul, rebirth etc. found in both the Jain and Yoga traditions are very close to each other.

South Asian Culture is a course that brings the cultural heritage of India to light. A course dedicated to the motherland was insightful and enriching for the students. Students enriched their knowledge of India and its rich contribution to the world with its insightful culture.

Graduate Courses

Prof. Oren B. Stier and Samani Chaitanya Pragya have developed following two graduate courses.

- Seminar on Sacred Sources
- Sanskrit Language

Under the course "Seminar on Secred Sources" Samani Chaitanya Pragya discussed "Concept of Violence and Non-violence in Jain Sacred Sources". She delivered lectures on the following topics in the consecutive three seminars:

- Jain Canons and Hermeneutical Tradition
- Violence and its Effect in Jain Scriptures
- Non-violence: Philosophy and Practice

The seminars covered the concept of equality of all souls, its environmental and ecological implications, interdependence of natural resources and the dreadful results of violence which is the direct or indirect root cause of human suffering and global problems.

Students had an opportunity to read the original canons like *Acharanga, Prashnavyakarana, Upasakadasha, Dasaviakalika and the philosophical treatise Tattvarth Sutra.*

New Courses offered in Fall 2011

Introduction to Jainism

Announcing Latika & Rajiv Jain Fellowship in Jain Studies at Florida International University

Candidates are sought for a two-year graduate fellowship to be awarded to a highly qualified and motivated student in Religious Studies with a concentration in Jain Studies.

Candidates must be proficient in English and have knowledge of at least one language of India, and have published works on Jainism and other religions of India, pursue a substantial research agenda, and should have significant field experience in India. The professor will teach a range of courses about the religions of India in general and Jainism in particular, and background in the field of religious studies and knowledge of world religions is desirable. The professor will work closely with the Jain Educational and Research Foundation, and will organize lectures and symposia.
